

Balloon Regatta Joins Elephant Days

The Fifth Annual Elephant Days will also include a Balloon Regatta and Glow both Saturday and Sunday morning, September 8-9.

"The balloons will be staged and lighted at the Elephant Days grounds Friday and Saturday

nights," according to organizer Al Lowenstein.

The balloons are scheduled to lift off from Lions Beach at 7 a.m., Saturday and Sunday.

"Of course it depends on the weather, but for the past five years we have had great

weather. Perhaps I should not have said that," Lowenstein laughs.

The first flight was completed in Paris, France, by Jean-Francois Pilatre de Rozier and Francois Laurent d'Arlandes on November 21, 1783. This flight made hot air balloon technology the oldest successful human-carrying flight technology.

Observers can see how beautiful and graceful

a hot-air balloon floats across the skies. But do you know what makes them so graceful in flight? A hot air balloon consists of a bag called the envelope that is capable of containing heated air. Suspended beneath is a gondola or wicker basket, which carries passengers and (usually) a



and (usually) a source of heat, in most cases an open flame. The heated air inside the envelope makes it buoyant since it has a lower density than the relatively cold air outside the envelope.

In today's sport balloons,

the envelope is generally made from nylon fabric, and the mouth of the balloon (closest to the burner flame) is made from fire resistant material, such as Nomex. Beginning in the mid-1970s, balloon envelopes have been made in all kinds of shapes, such as hot dogs, rocket ships, and the shapes of commercial products, though the traditional shape remains popular for most non-commercial, and many commercial, appli-

cations.

The cost of these balloons are comparable to new car, used car. The balloons can range anywhere from \$30,000 to \$45,000. When asked about the cost of putting a balloon in flight, Lowenstein answered,



"With the cost of gas, insurance, depreciation, repairs and other factors, the cost can range around \$150 per flight."

There will be approximately 15 balloons from Albuquerque, Colorado and Mexico at this year's event.

Lowenstein, who operates a flight school in Albuquerque, has been flying for more than 15 years, and has enjoyed many experiences.

The community is encouraged to view the glow on Friday and Saturday night and the take off at 7 a.m. Saturday and Sunday. There will be memorabilia available for purchase at liftoff sites.

2012 Elephant Man Tri Is Rapidly Approaching

Mark your calendars: September 30 is this year's date for the annual Elephant Man triathlon - an intermediate distance triathlon hosted by HEROS Inc., in Elephant Butte Lake State Park. This grassroots triathlon has become one of the most popular races in the state, and topnotch athletes and volunteers alike have been preparing for this exciting event, which is the culmination of five multi-sport events hosted in Sierra County by this not-for-profit organization.

Elephant Man Triathlon is also the final race of the New Mexico Open Water Triathlon series – a series of seven races that were hosted around New Mexico - in conjunction with New Mexico State Parks and three other race directors from Albuquerque, Ft. Sumner and Santa Rosa. This series allowed athletes to accumulate points at each event, and overall point series winners will be announced at Elephant Man.

More than \$9,000 in cash and prizes will be awarded to the point series winners. This is an exciting addition to not only the Elephant Man weekend, but to the New Mexico triathlon community, as public entities and private individuals have come together to collaborate and improve the quality of races and tourism for rural venues at the same time. Series organizers hope this is an example that local leaders will take note of and follow as we try to promote healthy endeavors throughout the state.

THE COURSE

The challenging and scenic course has not changed from the inaugural event in 2006. Athletes continue to find that it brings out the best in them, and unlike many other courses of this distance, no athlete has been able to break two hours on the demanding terrain of Sierra County.

The race consists of a 1.0-mile swim in Elephant Butte Lake (expected water temp of 74 degrees) just below the main entrance to the state park between

Marina del Sur and the dirt dam. As water levels continue to drop at this venue, organizers have not yet been able to select the exact swim course or transition run, but rest assured, it will be beautiful and brutally difficult at the same time.

Athletes then transition to a hilly and challenging, but scenic, 26.5-mile bike ride, traveling north through the city of Elephant Butte, and along the perimeter of the lake (State Highway 195 and 195P) before climbing up and out of Monticello Canyon to the other side of Interstate 25 and returning to the transition area below the main entrance to the State Park

The third and final leg is a unique opportunity to run six miles across Elephant Butte Dam. The initial and final portions of this out-and-back run take place along a graded trail just steps from the beach and campsites. This trail is in better shape than ever, thanks to continued efforts from the amazing State Parks staff at Elephant Butte Lake.

THE SCHEDULE

Race weekend is always full of fun activities for the whole family. It seems everyone's favorite, including Race Director Kori Mannon's, is the Elephant Kidz youth triathlon slated for Saturday, September 29, at 5 p.m. This youth race, just like its parent event, will be sanctioned by USAT (USA Triathlon Association), and will include a shallow depth open water swim, a bike leg and a run leg, all

graded in distance for age divisions. The age divisions will be based on the participant's age on Dec. 31, 2012 (USAT guidelines) and consist of 5-6 year old, 7-8 year old, 9-10 year old, 11-12 year old, 13-14 year old, and 15-16 year old divisions for both boys and girls.

All participants' parents or guardians must complete an Elephant Kids registration form (which will

be available online by September 1) and a USAT waiver. Registration for the youth race will begin onsite (Marina del Sur parking lot Race Headquarters) at 4 p.m., and will be complete by 4:45 p.m., at which point participants will have a mandatory pre-race briefing prior to the 5 p.m. start.

Participants must wear safety certified bike helmets while on the bike course and comply with the basic guidelines of all USAT-sanctioned races, but will be well supported by area volunteers to ensure their safety on the course.

Swim angels (adults standing arm distance apart) will line the shallow depth swim course so children feel safe.

Local cyclists will accompany the children on the bike portion to ensure a safe return to transition, and

volunteers will also line the run course so that children successfully complete the final out-and-back portion of the event. Exact routes for this youth race are still being approved, and may differ from years past, due to the changing water levels, but will include distances approximate to those listed below.

For the third consecutive year, HEROS Inc. volunteers have worked to train 15 area youth on the Grupo Loco Triathlon team (the state's first organized youth triathlon team) and many of these local youth



will participate in the Elephant Kids Tri. This is by far one of the more exciting and inspiring events Elephant Butte has ever seen. Please come out to volunteer and cheer on these young athletes who have worked throughout the summer to learn new skills, set goals, become more fit and all of whom "tri like

crazy!"

Between the youth and adult races, the weekend schedule fills with packet pick up times, pre-race meetings and of course some free time

for athletes to tour the area, and enjoy local restaurants and businesses.

Race headquarters (HQ) is located in the parking lot adjacent to the Marina del Sur parking lot). Elephant Man Cove is the cove adjacent to Marina del Sur and the dirt dam.

Scott Kennicutt has been one of the main volunteers since year one and says he continues to volunteer "for the general betterment of the community and to change mindsets about healthy activities."

Traci Woods has been the longstanding registration and packet pick-up coordinator, and has started volunteering at Grupo Loco practices and other youth races. She says it's fun to meet many of the athletes, and it feels good that she can use her skills to help others, but above everything else, watching the kids have fun and meet their goals is amazingly rewarding and inspiring.

Chuck Looney coordinates the bike leg of the race. He has designed, fabricated and shared with other race directors plans for state-of-the-art bike racks that safely hold the athletes high tech race bikes and equipment. He also works to make sure the roads are marked, swept (by New Mexico State Park and Bartoo Sand & Gravel) and monitored by volunteers at each intersection and law enforcement at critical points on the course.

Walter Armjio helps to organize the American Legion Riders who host a water station on the bike course where volunteers not only offer water and Gatorade to cyclists, but also set up American Flags and cheer. He organizes motorcyclists who transport race officials on the course and serve as the lead and sag vehicles to show athletes the correct routes. He personally has transported the main USAT race official at each Elephant Man race, and says he is happy to do it, it's good for the community, and he

THE RULES OF THE ROAD

As race day draws closer, more and more athletes and volunteers will be out on the roads in our community. Please remember to use extreme caution. Bicyclists should be treated as any other vehicle on the roads. Only pass if you have an open and legal passing lane. Passing too close to cyclists is EX-TREMELY dangerous.

Additionally, please take note of the timeframe for the events. Although main roads are not closed to traffic, HEROS Inc. has worked to try to minimize the impact of the event on other community events and residents. If you must use course roads and locations during the event, please be prepared for some delays and slower moving traffic – volunteers and athletes alike must be protected while on the course.

The balloonists then do a water landing, known as a "Splash and Dash," receiving the baton and carrying it to the designated drop area. Awards follow for both the winning pilots and skippers.

Distances are broken out by age group. The children's athletic event is followed on September 23 by the challenging Elephant Man Triathlon at 7 am, on the Dirt Dam beach area, Elephant Butte Lake State Park Course. Elephant Man Triathlon is an intermediate distance triathlon, perhaps the longest and most challenging course in the state.
